MULTISTOREY SYNERGY

R eflections Waterfront Apartments is not just a residential/commercial development, it is an asset to the lifestyle of Perth. The two mirrored, slender buildings rise to 25 floors above the Swan River, with rooftop lighting which adds a prominent new feature to the evening skyline.

Extensive landscaping and streetscape improvements have created an attractive pedestrian link between Adelaide Terrace and Burt Way, including heritage interpretive displays, public artworks, pedestrian canopies, pathways and rehabilitation of native cypress pines.

It is the result of a synergistic relationship between the developer, Finbar Group, SS Chang Architects and builders Hanssen Project Management. These three companies work collaboratively to deliver some of Perth's most exciting and innovative developments.

Reflections Waterfront Apartments combines commercial space on the ground floor level of a low rise three story building, fronting Terrace Road, which will bring new life into the street. The second and third levels are two and three bedroom apartments.

The two towers behind the low rise both offer a two and three bedroom range of apartments and also penthouses to suit the diverse lifestyles of tenants, in addition to possessing a 21 metre lap pool, residential lounge and meeting facilities, gymnasium, sauna, spa, games room and 292 undercroft parking bays. There are also tennis courts at the rear of the site. All of the apartments have been designed with a large balcony at least 25m2 integrated with the main internal living area and main bedroom, to create a space for outdoor living and entertaining.

Gerry Hanssen of Hanssen Project Management said one of the biggest construction challenges was the 11 metre high rear retaining wall. Two eastern States subcontractors were used, Vibro-Pile from Melbourne for the pilings, and Hyatt from Sydney for the pressing anchors.

For flooring, FormFloor panels from Gocrete were used, and the formwork for the core was an American product, Symons Aluminium Formwork. "This is a very simple formwork system," said Gerry Hanssen. "And it is very easy to use by low-skilled workers."

Reflections Waterfront Apartments is primarily built from precast concrete, with marble cladding on the lower level and in entry foyers. Low-E glass was used for the project, to minimise heat ingress and UV glare for tenants and also cut indoor climate control costs during summer. Low energy lighting has been incorporated for all public area lighting, including the rooftop.

The construction period lasted two years, and involved 120 of Hanssen's 500 workers. His company has been in the West Coast construction game since 1993, and began teaming up with Finbar in 1997. Together they have created many commercial developments and residential buildings, including Monterey Bay, Bluewater, Cosmopolitan, Arum & Samphire, the Westralian, Infinity Apartments and Soho Apartments. The next major project scheduled for construction later this year is the 27 storey Fairlanes mixed use office and residential development in Adelaide Terrace.

Sales of apartments and commercial spaces in some of their other recent projects such as Verve Apartments, Circle Apartments and The Saint are a testament to how healthy demand is for upmarket property.

Another project that the Finbar/Hanssen/SS Chang team are building is the Gateway development in Victoria Park. This commercial development is aiming for a 4 Green Star rating.

Here, Hanssen's have achieved an Australian first by utilising the Swedish designed BubbleDeck, a biaxial semi-precast decking which cuts on site concrete pours by fifty per cent. The BubbleDeck replaces non-structural concrete with rigid plastic bubbles. It is lighter, easier to install and faster to achieve project milestones than using traditional full concrete slabs. It also requires no beams and offers up to 50 percent greater spans between columns, freeing up floorspace and allowing greater flexibility for architectural design.

It is this mix of innovation and experience which makes Finbar, SS Chang and Hanssen a winning trio in the West.
