Southern Cross built Cammeray Square for its client Hamptons and Namsuah, in a \$31 million mixed-use project, redeveloping the old Clarke & Walker/Mitre 10 site – known unofficially as the Gateway to Cammeray. Cammeray Square has been heralded as a major addition to the Cammeray community with its focus on contemporary lifestyle and convenience. Designed by award-winning architectural firm Marchese + Partners, Cammeray Square features 39 spacious two and three bedroom apartments and penthouses, each with its own large private alfresco area.

There are four levels of retail space and retail parking levels that have been purchased by Stockland (SGP); the retail centre will be branded Stockland Cammeray. Stockland Retail CEO John Schroder said, "Cammeray Square provides a unique retail opportunity in a soughtafter, high-traffic location in a strong demographic area. We look forward to creating a convenient high quality retail offering for the local community."

Cammeray Square consists of four boutique buildings set around a central, granite-paved piazza landscaped by Eckersley Stafford Design. Set in its heart is a landscaped podium, featuring a large, custom-made metal sculpture by Adelaide-based artist Greg Johns. Other features of note include a myriad of façade finishes such as render, timber cladding, louvres and aluminium cladding. A rainwater collection tank is in place for use within the commercial areas and for a central water feature.

From modest beginnings, Southern Cross Project Group has grown to a revered group with over 200 employees and a construction portfolio of more than 2000 residential, commercial and industrial buildings equalling \$700 million in combined costs.

The company is steeped in building history. Its three founding directors, Lewis Yazbek, Rick Yazbek and Craig Irwin, all come from families of builders, as does Andrew Box, who joined the group in 1998. Making experienced and informed choices, the equipment selected for the residential component was Mitsubishi Heavy Industries VRV and for the commercial it was a new range from Temperzone Australia, the HWP & CC series equipment, recently released to meet the MEPS requirement for new refrigerant R410A.

"With projects of this scale," Souvaliotis says, "Clear communication is essential. We need to understand what our client's requirements are and then fulfill those requirements without impacting on the overall works. As always our installation was on time and within budget and we liaised closely with the other trades to ensure the minimum of disruption to all parties."





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SOLID AS A ROCK

effery and Katauskas Pty Ltd are a highly respected company of Geotechnical and Environmental Engineers. Based in Sydney they provide expertise worldwide in areas including geomechanical, subsoil mapping, construction, site investigations and foundation evaluation. In recent years, Jeffrey and Katauskas have completed more than 900 geotechnical investigations annually in all states of Australia.

Involved from the initial concept through to the detailed design and construction phase at Cammeray Square, preliminary work saw subsurface geotechnical (borehole) investigations carried out in stages by Jeffery and Katauskas. They provided detailed descriptions of the site, subsurface conditions and recommendations on the excavation methodology, excavation support, rock face treatment, retaining wall and footing design. Jeffery and Katauskas subsequently drilled boreholes along the Amherst Street boundary in May 2007 to provide geotechnical design parameters for reconstruction of the road pavement.


The Structural Engineer, Robert Bird Group, prepared and supplied engineering drawings for the new building, primarily concerned with the stepped bulk excavation, shotcrete basement walls and building footings. Jeffery and Katauskas reviewed the drawings and deemed them to have adopted the recommendations given in their geotechnical reports.

During the design development stage, the design team (Jeffery and Katauskas, Robert Bird and Southern Cross) were involved in negotiations with the Roads and Traffic Authority, who were concerned about the impact of excavations on footings supporting the nearby Miller Street road bridge over the Gore Hill Freeway and the road-cutting adjacent to the southern boundary of the Cammeray Square site.

Visiting the site on numerous occasions during the construction, Jeffery and Katauskas inspected and mapped the vertical cut faces around the perimeter of the excavation and along the steps in the excavation for the various building platforms. They provided advice on support and stabilisation requirements using measures that varied from cleaning debris off the face to large areas of rock-bolt, mesh and shotcrete support.

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NO JOB REFUSED

ullers Mobile Cranes have a simple but persuasive motto: Nothing's a problem! No job, big or small, has ever been refused in the company's 19 year history.

It is this kind of attitude that has seen Fullers awarded some of Sydney's highest profile jobs recently. They provided the cranes and riggers for the placement of the NZ digger on the Anzac Bridge, ensuring that the launch of the WWI symbol proceeded smoothly and honoured the

In keeping with this historical theme, Fullers are currently hard at work for the City of Sydney's Walter Read Reserve Revitalisation project. Walter Read Reserve is significant as its reservoir formed a part of NSW's early water supply systems. The Reserve, in inner city Paddington, is undergoing sympathetic remediation involving work of an extremely delicate nature. Archaeologists are onsite and Fullers have worked around sensitive excavations and stabilisations. In their collection of cranes, Fullers have one of only two Demag AC55 cranes in NSW; the AC55 is the only crane able to fit on a worksite such as this.

The AC55, along with a 30t. Tadano and 20t. Franna, was also used on the Cammeray Square development, a large-scale job for Fullers. Over a 12 month period they provided cranes for hoisting of building and pre-cast materials along with the structural formwork. Fullers specialise in customising the cranes they use to their clients needs and providing a start to finish consultative process.

Under Managing Director Larry Fuller, Fullers Mobile Cranes have serviced NSW since 1989. A mobile crane hire and materials handling company that started with 1 crane has now grown to 20 employees and 13 cranes in constant demand. Past jobs have included the Cross City and Lane Cove tunnels, the M7 and the North Head Sewage treatment plant with their challenging motto, who knows what the future will bring?

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THE GREEN CONNECTION

ontemporary research from a UTS team led by Margaret Birchett has shown the tremendous value of live plants in the indoor environment. Volatile Organic Compounds (VOCs) produced by furnishings, carpets, paints, and other emissions can be "eaten" by the plant's microbe rich soil to reduce toxin levels by up to 70%.

Sponsoring Birchett's work through the NIPA (National Interior Plantscape Association), The Container Connection proudly service their largest customer group - indoor plant hire companies - with commercial grade plant containers characterised by their strength and lightweight feel. Their use of resilient materials such as fibreglass, polyethylene and stainless steel ensure they are transportable and hardy, whilst remaining aesthetically pleasing. The Container Connection use planters with a reservoir sub-irrigation system for plants to wick water as needed. These systems use less water, have no drainage loss and extend service time as they allow longer time periods without watering. The Green Building Council, tirelessly working to design greener buildings, gives Green Star rating points to developments with live plants and planter sub-irrigation systems.

For Cammeray Square, The Container Connection custom-designed standalone fibreglass planters, 1.5m long by 870mm high and 450 wide. These aesthetically captivating containers have a black satin finish with a wedge shape and smooth, tapering lines. The benefits of these

standalone planters becomes obvious when you consider that sowing plants into concrete or masonry that is on the slab causes damage to construction through active roots, moist soil and rupture of the waterproof membranes. The Container Connection provide a guarantee to construction work as their planters are always separate; they can also retrofit liners to concrete or masonry boxes.

Other notable projects for The Container Connection include the immense sub irrigated troughs on roof of Newcastle Boys Grammar (2007) which give credence to the establishing trend of roofs as a greening option area, and the new Sydney Virgin Blue Business Lounge.
