

AN IMPRESSIVE RECOVERY



The \$454.6 million Cairns Hospital redevelopment provides an expanded range of facilities capable of meeting the needs of the Cairns and Hinterland Health Service District, and the broader catchment areas of Cape York and Torres Strait.

Developed in two stages since 2010, the Health Services at Cairns Hospital now include 13 operating theatres, an ambulatory cancer care centre with a new radiation oncology service, additional cardiac care facilities and additional surgical capacity, including day surgery. There has also been the expansion of intensive care capacity, expanded birthing services and a special-care nursery, a new low-risk Family Birth Centre, additional aged care and rehabilitation services, additional beds for mental health services, and new pathology facilities.

Designed by Jackson Architects, Brisbane, and Fisher Buttrose Architects in Cairns, the building layout and features have already won construction awards. Their design not only maximises the views and prevailing cool sea breezes, but captures the architectural character relevant to the region,

with defined entries and special screening to reduce the impact of the sun, as well as cyclones. The hospital's perfect tropical seaside location, between Lake Street and the Esplanade, creates a landscaped breezeway to the hospital's entrance. The building works seamlessly integrate the renovation and expansion of four existing buildings. Covered link bridges between buildings and over streets provide pedestrian access around the hospital and to multi-storey car parks. The exterior colours of yellow, white and crimson red are inspired by the many surrounding frangipanis, and mark the entry, identify spaces, and connect with the vibrancy of the interior layout.

Due to significant space constraints and the sensitivity of working in a hospital precinct environment, the project has involved detailed

planning and coordination to successfully allow hospital services to continue operating throughout the course of the project.

August 2014 saw the opening of the clinical services Block D, part of the redevelopment of Cairns Hospital. This marked a milestone, with more than 250 inpatients transferred and safely relocated in under an hour.

Block D is now the hub of the hospital. Housing half of the hospital's 531 inpatient beds, and the 32-bed Orthopaedic Ward on the top floor, it has panoramic views of the city skyline, mountains and inlet, for staff, patients and visitors to enjoy. The Orthopaedic ward has been years in the planning, with staff contributing to the overall ward design, as well as the furniture, fittings and equipment. It includes a dedicated plaster room, allowing patients to be conveniently treated in the ward and in a timely manner, plus a new gym for dedicated patient orthopaedic rehabilitation. Block D also features a newly developed main entrance to the hospital, a ground-floor pharmacy

service, increased short-stay beds with direct access to the emergency and medical imaging departments, new cardiology inpatient unit and coronary care unit, day surgery and procedural areas that are directly linked to operating theatres. This redevelopment moves the hospital into the next century.

The extra operating theatres in Cairns Hospital's new Block D are crucial in its aim to become the top choice for elective surgery in Australia. In the past eight months, the hospital has already managed to reduce elective surgery waiting lists by almost 90 per cent, from 769 patients to just over 80. Having these extra theatres will allow surgeons to work more normal hours, instead of through the night and on weekends.

The next stage of the redevelopment involves the refurbishment of existing Blocks A, B and C, and is scheduled for completion in early 2016.

When it comes to hiring cranes, Century Cranes, which has grown into “the largest crane hire company in Cairns,” is hard to beat. Century Cranes provided all the mobile cranes to the Cairns Base Hospital site, as well as erecting, and on completion, dismantling the tower cranes on site.

In 1979 Cairns Steel Fabricators was established and are now one of the largest steel fabricators in Queensland. The company purchased cranes to erect structural steel and it soon became a realisation that there was a need for a crane hire company in Cairns. Cairns Steel began hiring out cranes to local builders and as the demand grew, they established Century Cranes. Today, Century Cranes operates a fleet of cranes ranging from a 13T City Class to 200T All Terrain.

Century Crane’s had a crew of 34 that had worked on the hospital project. The tower cranes (owned by another contractor) were erected by Century Cranes. The tallest was 60m.

These cranes were used to lift a variety of materials for all contractors on site. The mobile cranes used were All Terrains due to the weather conditions in Cairns and varied in size from 13 ton up to 200 ton.

Century Cranes met the challenges of the difficult conditions produced both by high winds on the site was and the need of the existing hospital to continue its services.

Century Cranes works mainly in North Queensland, Central Queensland and Papua New Guinea, however, cranes are available on request to anywhere. The company does all that is requested of them, as long as they can perform the task safely.

“The secret to Century Cranes success is no secret - it’s about our cranes, our crew and our service,” says a company spokesperson. “Our management team and crew are passionate about what they do and it is through their passion, that each and every client experiences a level of professionalism and service that exceeds expectation.”
